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INTRODUCTION



UNIVERSITY OF GHANA

The University of Ghana (UG) is the premier and the largest university in Ghana, and one of the most prestigious universities in Africa. Legon is the name given to the University of Ghana from the Ga language meaning, "the hill of knowledge." The school offers a variety of business, humanities, and science courses while promoting the values of integrity, commitment, respect, and loyalty.

UG was founded as the University College of the Gold Coast by Ordinance on August 11, 1948, for the purpose of providing and promoting university education, learning and research. As a University poised to distinguish itself in the area of research to make an impact on the national and international level, the University is guided by a vision of becoming a world-class researchintensive University with four priority areas where the University will focus and promote international collaboration in research initiatives. to enhance the University's research output.

GHANA TO THE WORLD UG SUMMER SCHOOL

Ghana to the World (GTW), is a three-in-one summer school. It is held in June for up to 4 weeks where participants can study and obtain credit, tour the vibrant and diverse regions in Ghana, and become catalysts for social impact and transformation through volunteering in disadvantaged communities. Participants also get to engage in fun cultural activities while experiencing the lush, green campus of the University of Ghana. Using the medium of interactive lectures that seek to immerse students in discussions on Africacentered topics, GTW tells the story of Africa from the perspective of Ghana. It offers a unique opportunity for intellectual exploration and cultural enrichment, building a new network of friends, and expanding your understanding of the world.

- Explore cultural and historical attractions

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE

GTW programme runs in January and June. June is the summer cohort for up to four weeks and focuses on three models:

- Study and Obtain Credit (40 hours)
- Tour Ghana (Greater Accra, Central, Volta and Eastern regions-20 hours)
- Volunteer (30 hours)



1. STUDY & OBTAIN CREDIT

The satisfaction of intellectual curiosity is a vital component of the GTW summer school. Two pairs of courses are offered, and participants may select one pair:

Pair 1: Appropriate Technology for Development in Africa and Gender and Culture in Africa Pair 2: Africa and the Diaspora and Chieftaincy and Development in Africa

Each pair of academic courses counts for 6 credits with 4 lecture sessions a week for 10 hours. Intellectual content consists of PowerPoint lectures, group discussions, videos, and visits to historical sites, museums, and a traditional village setting to investigate the diverse sources of stimuli that shaped and continue to influence Ghanaian societies.



COURSES

Africa and the Diaspora

This course explores some of the fundamental issues in the trade of enslaved Africans. While it focuses on the trans-Atlantic slave trade it contextualises slavery as an institution across time and space to understand its nature, impact and legacies on Africa, Europe and the Americas as compared to other forms of forced subordination. The course draws attention to various parts of the Atlantic world to identify different types of involvement in the slave business and to understand the implications at the local as well as the global level.

Chieftaincy and Development in Africa

This course examines the history of chieftaincy and other forms of traditional political leadership in Africa. It is concerned with the relationship between traditional authority and social, cultural, political and economic transformation that took place from precolonial times to the present. The course is also about debates and discussions on the relevance or otherwise of chieftaincy and other forms of traditional leadership in Africa, especially the role of chiefs in resource management and development in Africa.



Appropriate Technology for Development in Africa

This course focuses on the discourses on, practices with, and outcomes of technology in the transformation processes in Africa. It is premised on the assumption that technology mediates development processes globally and in Africa, whether sustainably or not.

Globally, human progress towards social well-being, economic progress, and environmental conservation has impacted and been shaped by technology, in ways that either pose threats to or opportunities for our common survival as humans.

Based on the recognition that technology increasing plays a central role in human progress, the ways technology is conceived of and applied are among the most important topics and narratives that form the bases of policy and programmes aimed at governing human progress. In this course, the concepts of technology and development, the relationship between them, as well as outcomes for social and environmental sustainability would be analysed.

Gender and Culture in Africa

This course examines how culture shapes the positions of women and men in African societies, and analyses cultures and cultural practices as dynamic, contested and rooted in socio-economic conditions and power relations. Key concepts in gender studies are analysed concerning debates about accepted notions of culture. Students will be encouraged to reflect on their own experiences of gender and their role in reinforcing and transforming the nature of gender relations in society.

Academic courses are paired as follows:

Pair 1: African Technology and Gender and Culture in Africa

Pair 2: African Diaspora and Chieftaincy and Development in Africa

2. TOUR GHANA

This model is designed to enable participants to engage in experiential study and cultural tours of four regions in Ghana while savouring their culinary delights. Start your GTW cultural experience in the capital Accra, with excursions to several historic sites such as the Kwame Nkrumah mausoleum, Independence square, WEB Du Bois centre for Pan African studies, Artist Alliance Art Gallery, and unique coffin makers of Teshie.

Enjoy the hustle and bustle of the open-air Mokola market after which you may stroll through the old commercial hub of Jamestown and the multicultural and cosmopolitan area of Osu. The Central region offers a once-in-a-lifetime experience of the rainforest with some of the world's rarest butterfly species and a canopy walkway suspended over 1000feet above the ground in the Kakum National Park as well as a guided tour of the slave river at Assin Manso where enslaved people had their last bath. Witness man's inhumanity to man at the Cape Coast slave fort and reflect on your journey with a serene night stay at the Coconut Grove beach resort on the Atlantic ocean.

A change of pace awaits you as you embrace Ghana's eco-diversity in the Volta region and interact with the local wildlife in the Tafi Atome monkey sanctuary, hike to Mount Afadjato, the highest mountain in Ghana with elevations of 885 metres (2904 feet), experience the serenity of the Wli waterfalls and visit the largest man-made lake in the world, Volta Lake.




3. VOLUNTEER

Participants are offered service-learning opportunities for eight (8) hours weekly in collaboration with a non-profit organisation, Fafali located in a historically disadvantaged community in Accra. Fafali's main priority is to empower underserved and marginalized children in Ghana, one community at a time through education, environment and sanitation, gender equality, sports and parasports and entrepreneurship programmes for children in Accra, from 5 to 18 years.

Cultural Expressive Activities are designed to immerse participants in social programmes that nurture new ideas, gain expert insight, and stimulate creative thinking to enlighten, entertain and inspire.
